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DESCRIPTION

The Daher Kodiak 100 Series III is a rugged, high-wing, single-engine turboprop utility aircraft built for pilots and operators who need real-world capability beyond paved runways. 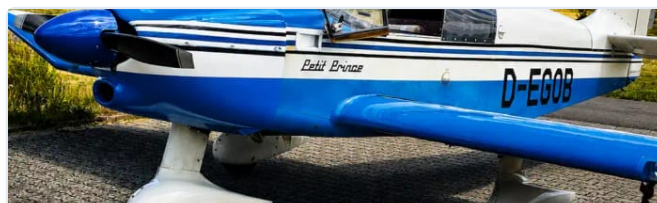
